Every spring, millions of migratory birds (166 species) fly to Alaska from 6 continents. Alaska supports 66% of the primary breeding populations of the shorebird species found in the US. 20% of all waterfowl in North America use Alaska's 100 million acres of wetlands for breeding habitats.
